American women's track racing group touring England from September 1889 to January 1890

In the United States, track cycle racing became widespread during the 1880s, following its popularity in Great Britain, but unlike Great Britain, and women were regularly participating in handicapped races against men. Mike Fishpool [1] describes how mixed handicap races, rather than women-only race guaranteed good crowds and a healthy revenue. By 1889, women were competing in 6 day races, usually for eight hours per day and the British press reported [2,3] on a big event a Madison Square Gardens, New York from 11th-16th February 1889 "They rode in heavy wooden tights, or rather leggings, with tight-fitting jackets, and caps pulled down clues upon their heads. There was no ribbon frippery, and on the back of each appeared her number in the race. The ages claimed by each ran from 17 to 24." The total receipts from the weeks racing were over \$10,000 of which the riders received about \$4,000 split as, Stanley 40%, Von Blumen 20%, Oakes 15%, Snallor 10%, Lewis 8%, Baldwin 5%, Hart 2%. Armando received \$300, McShane and \$Brown 235. Attendance on the final night was 4,000. [4]

In September 1889 five of the star American women cyclists toured Britain for four months, the women were Louise Armaindo, Lottie Stanley, Jessie Woods, May Allen and Lillie Williams. Women racing on high bicycles was a novelty in England but fairly commonplace in America. They were accompanied by their agent American JN Gannon and Louise Armaindo's trainer, the Canadian athlete Tom Eck. An extensive history of early women's track racing in North America is given in M Ann Hall's book *Muscle on Wheels: Louise Armaindo and the High-Wheel Racers of Nineteenth-Century America*.
